Career mentor program helps students, recent grads in search

Eastern Oregon University students and recent graduates who are seeking direction in their job search now have a new tool to employ. The Career Services Center and Alumni Association have developed an online mentor program designed to help students and recent graduates connect in their occupational field of interest.

"We've been doing this for about a year now," said Career Services Director Sally Click. "We've recruited alumni, friends and parents of the institution and have about 40 mentors in our pool."

Click would like to have the mentor pool increase in diversity.

"With our high numbers of liberal arts and business majors, more mentors representing a wide variety of career fields the better," she said. "We are dedicated to having people in the pool and bringing people to the pool to take

advantage of the wealth of career information."

Students and graduates can access the mentors when they want to get information on a particular career field. Those who use the Mentor Connection are coached on what questions to ask. Those who sign on as mentors are coached on how to respond to questions. Mentors have the option to be contacted by phone, e-mail or both.

"It's about developing contacts and getting ideas," said Click, stressing that the mentors are not there to hand out jobs.

"Good information on career fields helps students make good decisions," said Click.

"For mentors, this is a great way to share their time, talent and expertise."

Pioneer Bank kicks off regional Science Center fund-raising campaign with gift

Pioneer Bank made the first corporate contribution toward the Eastern Oregon University Foundation's Science Center regional fund-raising campaign on Sept. 23.

Pioneer Bank's gift of \$10,000 was presented to the EOU Foundation, which is committed to raising \$4 million in support of the Science Center.

"We're happy we can be a part of the kick-off for the regional fund-raising efforts," said Zane Lockwood, executive vice president at Pioneer Bank. "After seeing the large federal grant Congressman Greg Walden (R-OR) presented (in August), we thought it would be a good time to lead off with this gift and focus on the regional fundraising efforts."

Fewer credit hours needed for graduation

Eastern Oregon University students can earn their bachelor's degree with fewer credits now.

Starting fall term, students at any stage of their EOU college career need only a minimum of 180 total credit hours to earn a bachelor's degree – a reduction from 186 credit hours. The new policy applies to every student – freshmen through senior. The six credits eliminated can only be used for elective courses and not general educa-

tion, university or program-required classes.

The decision to lower the minimum credit hours came after John Miller, provost and vice president for academic affairs learned that EOU was the only Oregon University System school of the seven public universities in the state that still required a minimum of 186 credit hours.

Ribbon tying marks opening of new Science Center wing

A dream that has existed for 40 years became a reality of glorious proportions on Oct. 4.

The new wing of Eastern Oregon University's Science Center took flight during a ribbon tying ceremony Saturday morning.

"This is a gold mine of opportunity for improving and expanding our mission," EOU chemistry professor Anna Cavinato said.

The new 67,000-square-foot building features 27 high-tech labs, a large greenhouse, many classrooms and a 7,500-square-foot biotech lab.

Several ribbons were tied together during the ceremony to symbolize the many partnerships that have allowed the wing to be completed.

The building is the centerpiece of a \$33.5 million Science Center project. It will be completed over the next year with the renovation of EOU's old science building, Badgley Hall, and the addition of a 150-seat auditorium.

While construction of the new building started April 1, 2002, people have been discussing it ever since Badgley Hall was completed in 1965. The original Badgley Hall plans called for its expansion. Budget problems delayed the work, said Dixie Lund, EOU's interim president.

Still, EOU science professors and others refused to give up on the possibility of an expanded Science Center.

"They carried the dream," Lund said.

Phil Creighton, EOU's president for five years through July of last summer, set the wheels for the project in motion and kept them rolling. Lund saluted Creighton's creative and tireless efforts.

Creighton, now the president of Pacific University in Forest Grove, was among about 10 people who spoke at Saturday's ceremony. He led off his address by quoting a famous American essayist and author.

Mountaineer Hall of Fame Class of 2003

3 players, '69-70 men's hoop team inducted

The Mountaineer 1969-70 men's basketball team has left their mark at Eastern Oregon University as they become the first squad to be inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame.

The team, along with three athletes, were inducted into the Mountaineer Hall of Fame on Oct. 10.

The athletes who were selected include Renee Henslee-Miller (women's basketball 1981-83), Bob Warsaw (football 1979-80) and Romano Romani (football 1951-52).

The 1969-70 men's basketball team, the first Mountaineer squad to be inducted into the EOU Hall of Fame, finished with a 19-11 record and went 14-2 to win the Oregon Collegiate Conference title. Three players – Emory Moore, Mike Moore, and Kreg Wishard – were selected to the All-OCC team, with Emory earning All-NAIA District 2 honors. The team defeated Warner Pacific in the district semifinals, but fell to Linfield in the NAIA District 2 Finals in the best-of-three series. The squad set a

school record by winning 12 straight games and started OCC play with a 13-0 mark.

Henslee-Miller, a teacher at Powder Valley High School in North Powder, played basketball from 1980-83 at EOU and led the AIAW Division III in scoring with 20.2 points per game and 14 rebounds in the 1981-82 season. The following season she averaged 18.5 points, 11.5 rebounds and 4.8 assists per contest. She was voted Mountaineer Female Athlete of the Year for the 1981-82 and 1982-83 school years.

Warsaw, who works for Children and Family Services in Bend, played on the offensive line and received first team All-Evergreen Conference, All-NAIA District 2 and Associated Press All-Coast Team honors following the 1980 season. He was also co-captain on the Mountaineer team that finished as co-Evergreen Conference champions. In 1979, he was named second team All-Evergreen Conference.

Romani, of Redmond, played on the offensive line and was named All-OCC in 1951 and 1952. He also played baseball in 1954. He went on to coach baseball, football and wrestling at the high school level from 1957-93 in Neah-Kah-Nie, North Bend and Redmond.

Mountaineers join NAIA; drop NCAA III affiliation

Beginning with the Fall 2004 sports season, student athletes at Eastern Oregon University will only be playing with one set of rules.

EOU Interim President Dixie Lund announced Nov. 5 that the University has selected the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for its sole athletics affiliation. The school already participates in the Cascade Conference of the NAIA with most of its teams, including men's and women's basketball, volleyball, baseball, soccer, softball, cross-country and track and field. EOU was

accepted into the NAIA's Frontier Conference Dec. 11 for participation in football because the Cascade Conference does not sponsor that sport.

"We have been working with the issue of dual affiliation with the NCAA Division III and NAIA since 1996," said Lund. "The main issue is that playing within the restrictions of dual affiliation does not afford our student athletes the best possible intercollegiate athletic experience we can offer."

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — A nasty flu bug sent the best-laid plans of the Eastern Oregon University cross country men awry Nov. 22.

The Mountaineers went into the NAIA Nationals ranked No. 1 in the nation. They had high hopes of being the first EOU team to win a NAIA national championship.

But then, Alex McGladrey, Brian Crowl and Michael Greenman, EOU's three All-Americans from last year, were

stricken with a virus.

Despite the illnesses, EOU managed to come in 10th.

EOU was led by Eric Griffiths, who finished 34th. Crowl finished 52nd. Tim Riley finished 81st, while McGladrey, who had a fever Thursday, finished 114th.

The women came into the race ranked 22nd in the nation and they finished 21st. Jessyca Barker had a good race, finishing 42nd. Kelsey Jones came in 76th.

Dr. Khosrow Fatemi named EOU's 10th president

A San Diego State University dean of the campus has been appointed the new president of Eastern Oregon University.

The Oregon State Board of Higher Education approved Nov. 20 the appointment of Dr. Khosrow Fatemi, currently dean of the campus at San Diego State University - Imperial Valley, as EOU president, at an annual salary of \$163,000 and a three-year contract. Fatemi will begin at EOU in the spring.

Fatemi succeeds Dr. Dixie Lund, who has been serving as interim president since the departure of Phillip Creighton, who became president of Pacific University last spring.

"We could not be more pleased that Dr. Fatemi has accepted the position of president of Eastern Oregon University," said Phyllis Wustenberg, chair of the search committee and a member of the Board. "During the time that Dr. Fatemi was on campus, he demonstrated to the faculty, staff, students, and the entire campus community that he understood the needs of a growing and dynamic university that has very close connections with the La Grande community and other academic institutions," added Wustenberg. "Everyone was impressed with the caliber of each of the final candidates during their two-day visits on campus, and we appreciate all the time they spent in the many meetings, forums, and tours."

Richard Jarvis, chancellor of the Oregon University System, said, "Dr. Fatemi's selection reflects the voices and the needs of the EOU community. He has the vision and the requisite skills to lead EOU through its next phase of growth, and continue to strengthen and expand its relationships with other educational institutions. We are very excited to have Dr. Fatemi as part of the strong team of public university presidents that is establishing Oregon's leadership as

an innovative and adaptive state that is meeting the current needs of our students."

"Dr. Fatemi has the experience to help EOU continue its regional leadership in both campus-based academic programs and its diverse and distinguished distance education programs," said Jim Lussier, president of the Board. "With his solid management and economics background, he can continue EOU's tradition of being a student-centered university that provides its undergraduates with diverse educational and community involvement opportunities while enriching the campuses' financial stability."

Fatemi has been dean of the campus and professor of International Business at San Diego State University-Imperial Valley since 1998, where he has full responsibility for all aspects of the management of the campus. While at SDSU, Fatemi has led efforts to decentralize campus decision-making, enhance community outreach, increase student enrollment, introduce new programs, raise funds, and internationalize the campus.

Community and civic activities in which Fatemi has been involved include the Board of Directors for the U.S.-Mexico Chamber of Commerce and frequent testimony on international trade issues and collaboration. Fatemi

has served as president of the International Management Development Association, and was recognized by this group as "International Dean of the Year" in 1999. Fatemi is the founding editor of the Global Economy Quarterly and The International Trade Journal, and has written and contributed to numerous books and journals.

Prior to joining SDSU, from 1990-98, Fatemi was dean of the College of Business Administration and The Graduate School of International Trade and Business Administration at Texas A&M International University, and was professor of International

Business there beginning in 1982. From 1979-82, he was assistant professor of Business at Middle Tennessee State University. Before this, he was senior economist for the National Iranian Oil Company from 1972-79. Dr. Fatemi received his B.A. in Business Administration and Economics from the Abadan Institute of Technology; his MBA and his Ph.D. in International Relations are from the University of Southern California.

"I am very excited about joining the EOU and La Grande communities and eager to get to campus," said Fatemi. "Oregon has faced major financial challenges in recent years, and these are often more critical in the state's rural areas. It is truly a privilege to be able to join the Eastern Oregon community and help the University continue in its role as an educational leader and an economic driver in this part of the state."

EOU students rescue Hen Party history

This intriguing group of women last met 38 years ago and has only one surviving member.

They were on course to become a group that time forgot — until this summer.

The Hen Party is the group in historical question. Its members made a name for themselves by meeting annually from 1935 to 1965 for a two-week horseback trip into the Willows. Their story reveals much about life in Northeast Oregon during this era.

Theirs is a tale that has been secured by members of a class at Eastern Oregon University. Students in the Public Art and Service Institute class at Eastern have prepared an oral history of the Hen Party and made a bell commemorating the group. The students' work has anchored a piece of Northeast Oregon's legacy that was in danger of being buried by the sands of time.

"It was an interesting part of history that was at risk of fading away," said Rob Davis, an English/writing professor at EOU.

Davis and Doug Kaigler, an EOU art professor, taught the Public Art and Service Institute class.

The oral history the students captured is based on an extensive interview with Gerda Brownnton of La Grande, the last surviving member of the Hen Party. Brownnton went on Hen Party trips in 1946, 1948 and 1951. Being a part of the Hen Party was not something to be taken for granted since one had to be invited.

"It was a real privilege (to be invited)" Brownnton said in the oral history.

Membership criteria included possessing mountain horseback riding skills and ability to mix well with the group.

The Hen Party took its trips in August. The

women normally rode from Cove to Red's Horse Ranch and then followed the Minam River. They would stop at places such as North Minam Meadows, Steamboat Lake, Swamp Lake and Blue Lake.

Hen Party members in addition to Brownnton included Jean Birnie, Louise Epling, Mima McGuire Cooper, Edna Seitz, Julia Gilstrap, Esther Badgley, Doris Williamson, Marty Reece, Jean Hassel, Regina Quaintence, Margaret Revis and Enid Bottice. This list may not include everyone who was a part of the Hen Party.

The trips were led and organized by Birnie, a woman who knew much about horsemanship and wilderness survival. Birnie provided many of the horses for the trips but more importantly leadership and inspiration.

"She just shone out. Her personality was just absolutely fabulous," Brownnton said.

In its early years, before it was known as the Hen Party, men came on the trips. Once World War II started, the group became one exclusively for women since so many men were in the military.

The students in the EOU class who helped prepare the oral history and the commemorative bell were Ron Blincoe, Dawna Blincoe, Tom Clarke, Jasen Hansen, Kelly Smutz and Risa Tanzawa.

The oral history Davis's students made is 20 pages long and will be available later in area libraries and through Eastern Oregon University's Web site. The commemorative bell will be mounted at a home in Cove near where the Hen Party trips started each year. Details on where the bell is displayed will be announced later.

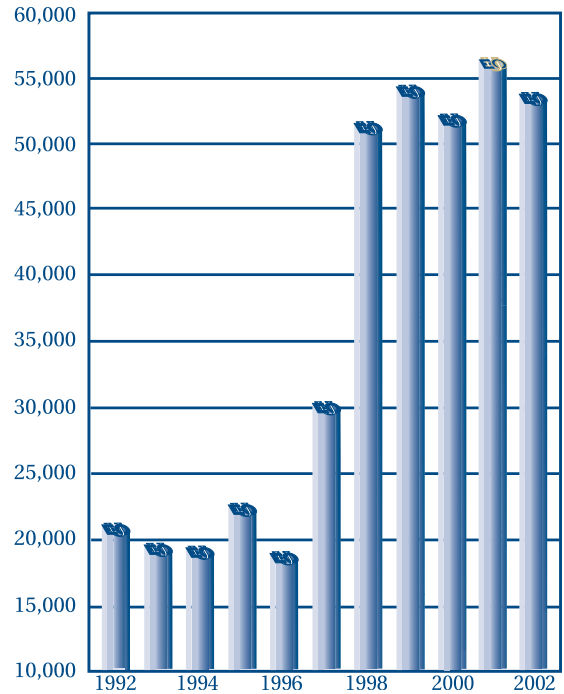
Annual Fund

The chart to the right shows a 10-year history of Annual Fund results. Precise dollar amounts are listed below:

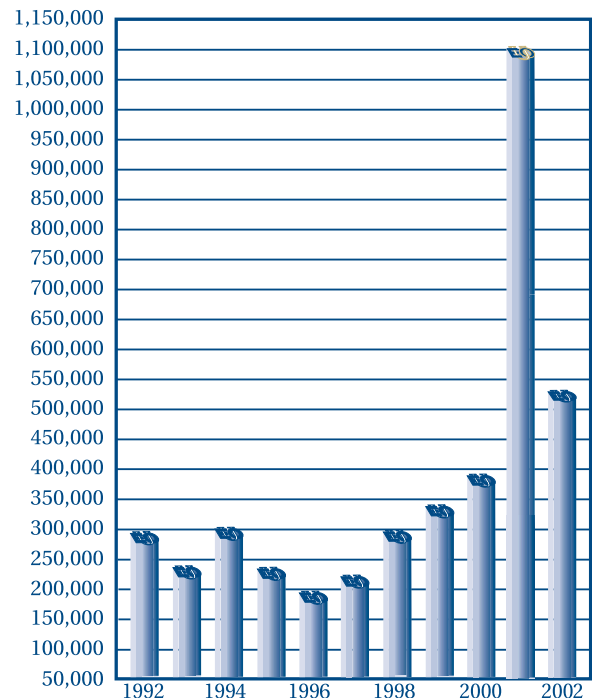

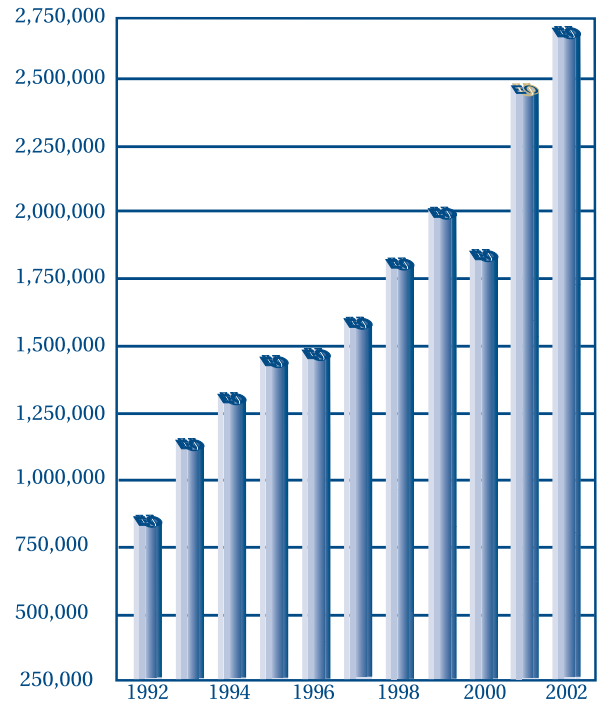


Net Assets

The “net assets” figure includes all funds—cash on hand, invested values, stocks and trusts held for the benefit of the University. This is the total “worth” of the Foundation.

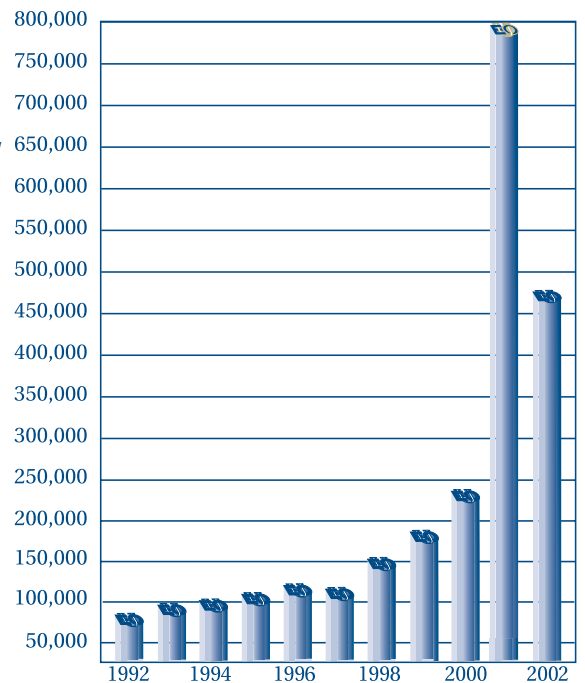

These revenues are restricted for use by the donors. This category often includes memorial gifts and monies given to specific scholarships. This figure does not include the principal of “endowed” gifts, those gifts that are permanently invested. But it does include earnings from endowed sums.

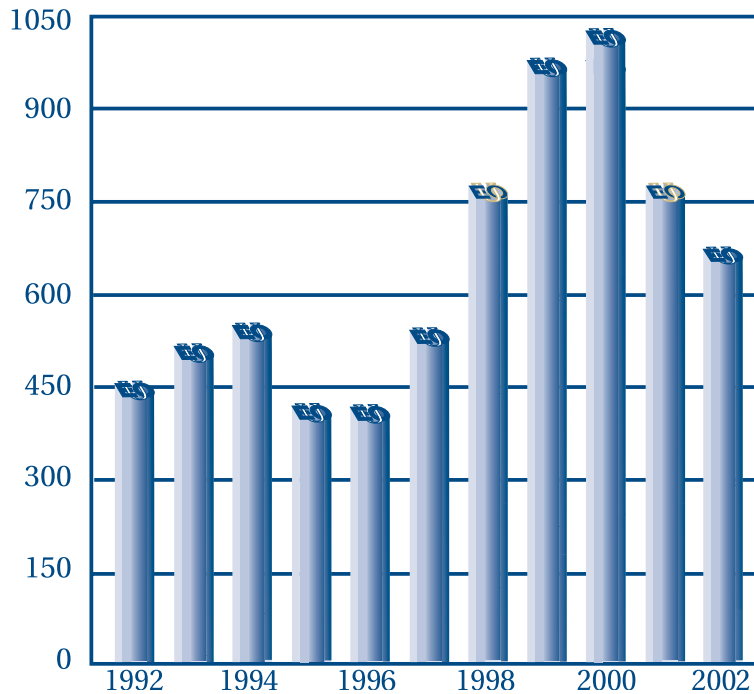


Donors

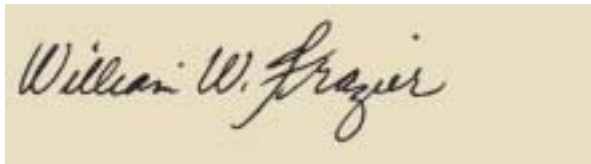
