Executive Summary

The purpose of the Eastern Oregon University Multicultural Center is to develop and deliver programs and services designed to support and retain students from socially and culturally diverse backgrounds. The Center offers an inclusive educational environment that nurtures cross-cultural communication and fosters the exchange of diverse perspectives and ideals.

In addition, the Center is committed to offering students a place to engage in multicultural activities that enhance their social and academic endeavors as well as prepare them for success in a diverse global society.

Progress on/Status of 2008-2009 Annual Goals

Goal 1: To foster within the University community a respect for and an appreciation towards the history, traditions, and cultures of campus and community members, by creating intentional programs and activities designed for everyone to participate in and increase their awareness and understanding of diversity.

Status: The Multicultural Center planned, organized and also sponsored a variety of events on campus that increased consciousness of diversity issues and provided appreciation and awareness of other traditions and cultures around the globe. Events were as follows:

- **Goal 2:** To provide multicultural students with academic, social, personal and other support services that assist in their academic and social development.
- **Status:** Currently in place and being utilized by students. Services provided by the Multicultural Center enable students to better understand the system, provide support in personal and academic issues and help students gain self confidence and be able to learn to advocate for themselves. Support services include:
 - Daily one-to-one meeting with students regarding a variety of issues including, but not limited to:
 - o Individual academic support
 - Tutoring support and referrals
 - Cultural and transitions issues
 - Academic planning and preparation
 - Personal issues support and referrals
 - One to one and group support sessions
 - o Financial Aid and Scholarship assistance
 - Understanding learning styles
 - General questions and inquiries

• Multicultural Student Orientation, September 23 -24, 2008

The Multicultural Student Orientation program is designed to address specific issues related to being a multicultural student at Eastern Oregon University and aid students in their transition to the campus and La Grande community. Activities include meeting current student leaders, meeting campus advocates, participating in a variety of sessions that address cultural transition issues, coping as well as fun activities to familiarize themselves with the community.

• Talking Circles

This program brings students together to promote positive intergroup conversations around issues of diversity, conflict, community, social justice and college success. The focus is to reduce inequity by examining similarities of experience and encouraging meaningful inquiry into relations between self and others.

- Oct. 8, 2008 Focus: Check in on the students, introduce the program and discussed financial packages, especially loans, good and not so good ones.
 *Seven individuals participated in this event.
 Oct. 24, 2008 Focus: Get to know each other activity; Touched on landlord issues and talked about Multicultural Student Council structure and constitution.
 *Thirteen individuals participated in this event.
- o Jan. 28, 2009 Focus: FASA application forms 2009-10 and scholarships. *Four individuals participated in this event.
- April 28, 2009 Focus: Alcohol & student liability. *Four individuals participated in this event.
- **Goal 3:** To serve as a resource for faculty and staff members attempting to understand, address and support underrepresented students in the educational process.

Status: Ongoing. During the past year, the Multicultural Center has worked with various faculty and campus departments to better understand diverse students. Issues range from basic classroom performance and expectations, to cultural transition, language and immigration status. Topics addressed with faculty is mainly on,

- o Cultural & Transition Issues Student in Core 101, 102 & HUM 110
- Class Expectations & Student Concerns Students in various Social Science & Education classes
- Academic Advising Issues Student not understanding their academic plan and not content with current advisor.
- Other issues (i.e. employment, landlord/tenant rights & responsibility, harassments, grievances and personal issues).

Goal 4: To provide a space for people to share, experience and celebrate diversity.

Status: The Multicultural Center is a place equipped for student use. We have a lounge with basic kitchen appliances and a computer lab that facilitates academic and social interactions. Throughout the year, the Center has been used for a variety of activities including weekly club meetings, study groups, class sessions, Math, Writing and Spanish tutoring, International Coffee Hour, receptions, pot lucks, and many more activities

• Multicultural Student Orientation, September 23 -24, 2008

The Multicultural Student Orientation program addresses specific issues related to being a multicultural student at EOU and aid in the transition to the campus and La Grande community. Activities include meeting advocates and student leaders, participating in a variety of sessions that address cultural transition issues, coping as well as fun activities to familiarize themselves with the community.

*Total of 18 students participated in the Multicultural Orientation; 8 were multicultural students and 10 were international students. Total of 6 returning student mentors assisted.

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• Discussions & Forums:

Presented four "What's Race Got to do with It?" discussion groups to develop self-awareness of group membership in context of systems of power and privilege and practice dialogue skills and constructive ways of addressing social justice issues and group conflict. Average participation was 12 people per event. The four discussion groups occurred on, 10/28/08, 11/12/08, 12/03/08 and 2/04/09.

Summary of Services & Programs for Students

- Advising providing students with advice regarding cultural, social, and academic
 development issues. This includes information about adjusting to the University setting,
 utilizing resources available and providing referral services for personal and academic
 advising.
- **Personal Social and Academic Assistance** through collaborative partnerships with various departments, the Center assists students in providing tutorial services, focus groups, campus involvement information, and general information sessions for students to develop skills that assist in their success.
- Computer Lab The MCC has a computer lab equipped with 5 computers for students to access for individual or group work on a daily drop-in schedule. The lab also has one computer designated for club leaders to use for planning and preparation purposes. The lab has a printer and office supplies for student use as well as a lab assistant to help with any issues that may arise.
- **Resource & Referral Services** Help students by providing essential information on maneuvering their way through college, provide support groups, educational scholarships, and referrals on other services and resources available to students.
- **Advocacy** the Center works with the Multicultural Student Council to advocate on behalf of all students on diversity and other issues that impact individual students and the campus community.
- **Recruitment Efforts** through collaboration with Admissions Office and other campus departments, the Center engages in outreach to prospective and newly admitted students by raising their awareness of who we are, what we have to offer, and how they can get involved when they come to EOU.
- **Student Clubs** the Center works with the Center for Student Involvement to offer student opportunities for development and to learn and appreciate their own cultural background, interests, values, beliefs, as well as the diverse backgrounds of other student groups.

- Staff training is needed to be more in line with current multicultural issues. Networking with other similar size campuses and learning new ways of continuing to improve our programs and services.
- With limited funding, the department will have to find creative ways to continue to
 provide quality programs that promote diversity and encourage an inclusive campus
 community.

* Lounge/Meeting area equipped with tables, chairs and couches available for meetings, mini-workshops/focus groups or just a hang out spot for people to visit with other each other, work on home work, or get extra help in classes. Also provided in the space is an entertainment center with a television, a DVD player, a VCR, AM/FM stereo with tape deck.

- * Kitchen space, furnished with a microwave, a refrigerator, and other household appliances for use
- * A Computer Lab with 5 computers, a printer and office supplies for student use on individual or group work
