Maxine Scates

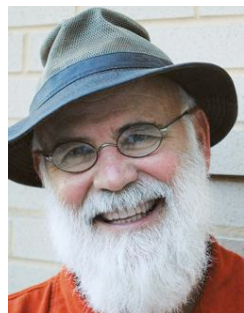
March 14 • 7:30 p.m. • Huber Auditorium
